The heart is the only edible part of the plant where the terminal bud can be chopped out of the center of a palm tree and eaten raw or cooked.

Edible Plants of Central Florida - Titusville, Florida

1. Burdock (Arctium lappa) This plant is easy to spot if you look for the annoying burrs. When those aren't present, look for a rosette of oblong, pointed leaves with no stem that grow close to the ground in the first year. Edible parts: The leaves are edible, but older leaves are tough and taste better when cooked.
